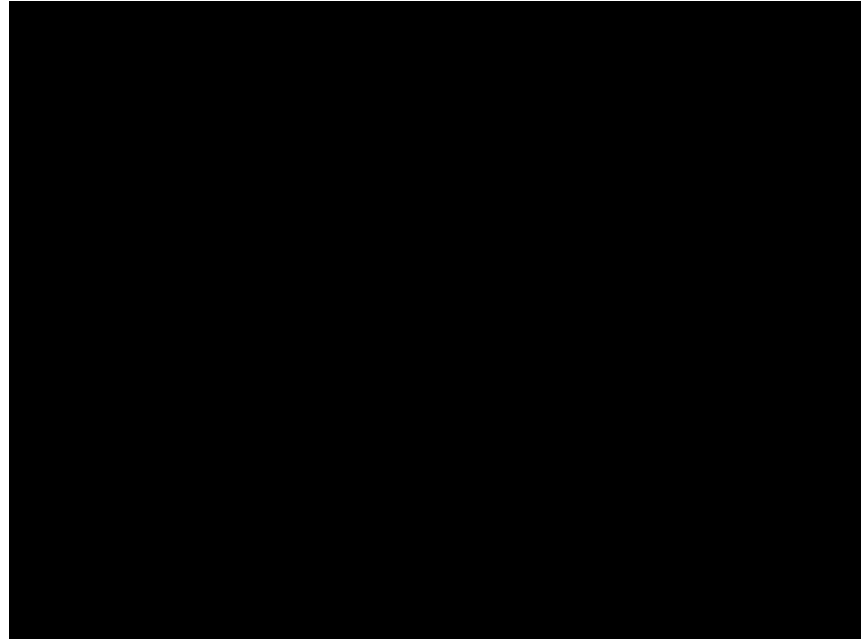


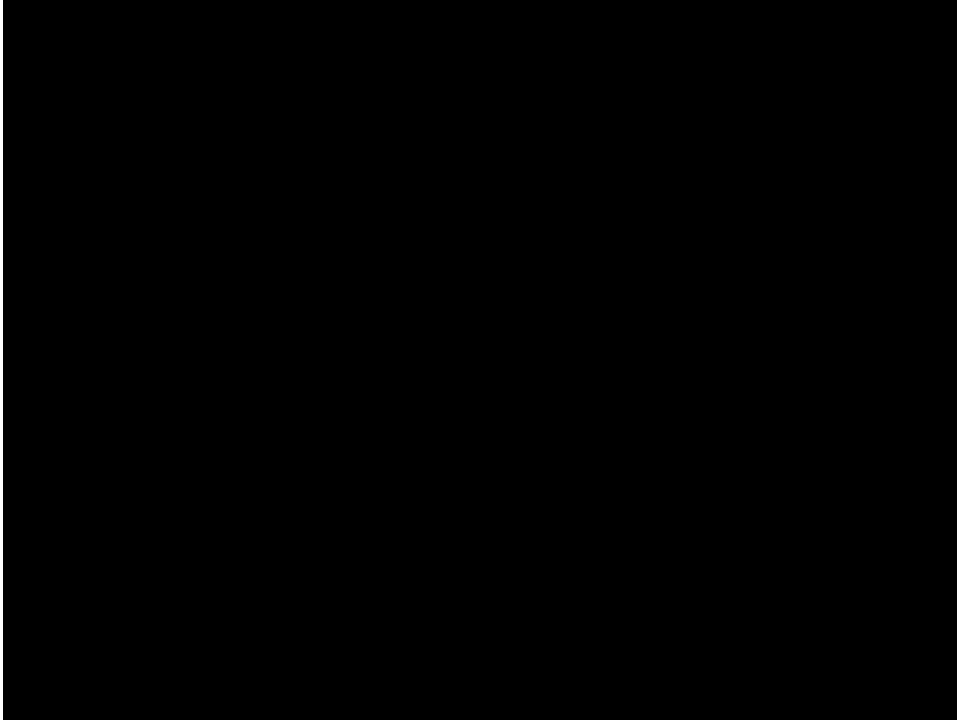

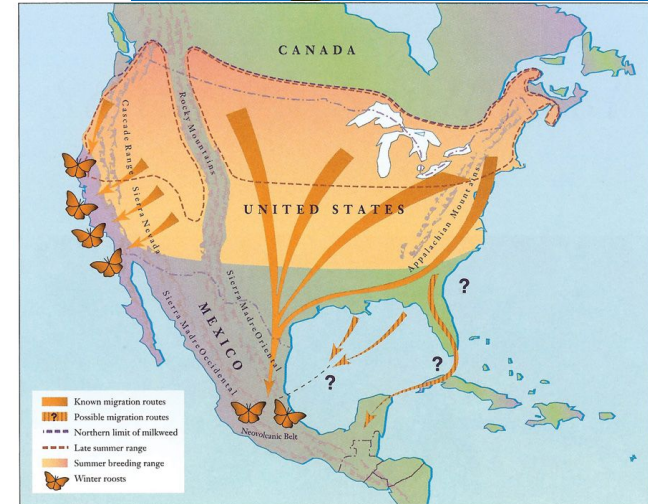
Monarch Chrysalises



# What are Monarch Butterflies?

Monarch butterflies are vital pollinators of the environment. Through their act of pollinating, food is being provided to many other animals and insects, as well as humans, by pollinating flowering plants (plants that bear flowers and fruits). However, they are soon to face extinction. If this does happen, many other animals will be endangered, including those who share habitats with monarch's, as well those who depend on monarch's (which is pretty much the entire ecosystem). We can help prevent their extinction by doing things such as :

- Planting milkweed
- Plantings nectar plants and flowers (especially ones that attract the butterflies)
- Creating habitats for them (and preserving them too)
- Plant native plants and perennials
- Don't pollute!
